2023 is feeling very positive here at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School with interesting learning themes across the school from the Warriner Multi-Academy Trust curriculum.

Having spent the Autumn Term focusing on themselves and their families, the children in Early Years are now looking outward and thinking about 'Where are they?' They are exploring different

animal habitats and adaptations to the different seasons. They are also finding out about London as our capital city, identifying some key London landmarks and finding out about some of the famous people that live there, exploring some of the similarities and differences between London and where they live.

In Key Stage One, the children are finding out all about 'The Great Rainforests'. This theme links to learning in many areas of the curriculum, including the 'explorers' in history, the location and features of the rainforests in geography, and plants and conditions for growth in Science. 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DID YOU KNOW?



The February photograph in the village calendar features a glimpse of the Manor, Sibford Gower. It comprises three 17th century cottages plus a farm barn and is now a single, rambling residential house with additions made between 1905 to 1910 by Queen Victoria's Pageant Master, Frank Lascelles. He was born in 1875 in Sibford Gower, the

youngest child of Isabella and the Rev. Edward Thomas Stevens, vicar of Sibford Parish. The family lived in the Old Rectory near the village pond. He went on to study English at Keble College Oxford and, although he never graduated, he played leading roles in the Oxford University Dramatic Society. He moved to London where he played various acting roles in London theatrical productions. His many artistic and creative talents gave him a fanciful persona and he took the name Lascelles to give him a more royal association once he was appointed Pageant Master to Queen Victoria.

He inherited one of the three village cottages on the death of his childhood nanny, gradually acquired the other cottages and barn, and started to create himself a village home where he could entertain his London set. The barn was built of coursed ironstone rubble under a hipped thatched roof. With a large projecting lateral brick chimney stack, two Early English lancets and 19th century casements, the oriel window at the left-hand end gave the resultant hall the feel of a minstrel's gallery. The central range, also of coursed ironstone rubble under a hipped thatched roof, consisted of two floors plus an attic. Lascelles added a square tower in the Arts and Crafts style with lancets and brick-built flying buttresses. The third section adjacent to the Old Methodist Chapel was coursed stone rubble to the front and brick to the rear under a hipped and gabled thatch roof. Many of the windows, including the large dormer, were latticed and some had crown glass. Stone flags, wooden planked doors, window seats, shutters and paneling were internal features. Lascelles added brick fireplaces and wooden stairs to connect the various floors.

When in Sibford, Lascelles assumed the lifestyle and title of 'Lord of the Manor' and actually purchased a document to establish his 'Lordship' despite his 'Manor' not being on the site of either of the original Manors established by King William following the Norman conquest.

When Lascelles died in 1934 his whole estate had to be sold to pay his creditors.

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NATURE NOTES

The unusually cold spell in December seems to have encouraged more wildlife to come into gardens presumably looking for food and water. Chris Beach reported deer in their garden in Woodway Road and I got the impression that there were more birds than normal in and around the bird feeders. Particularly noticeable were large numbers of Chaffinches as well as flocks of Gold Finches and Long-tailed Tits. Wood Pigeons and Stock Doves also seem to be present in ever increasing numbers. In smaller numbers but nice to see are Bullfinches, Nuthatches and occasionally a Pied Wagtail. On the other hand, it seems a long time since we have seen House Sparrows or Starlings in the garden.


Regarding birds finding novel food sources in times of hardship I was surprised to read that Great Tits have been observed going into Pipistrelle Bat roosts and killing and eating the bats. This was observed in one particular cave in an area of Hungary where the winters are particularly harsh and when offered alternative food the Great Tits ate that and stopped going into the cave.

WHAT WE'RE READING









I am writing this in January, and looking out at my sad, cold garden isn,t much fun. Those very hard and sudden frosts have done plenty of damage. The frosts hit many plants that were still flowering, for instance, my delphiniums were having one last show, and so were the hollyhocks. Worst of all dahlias were full of colour, and so they had not been lifted, or mulched to protect them. The next few months are going to be full of suspense, whilst I wait to see what might survive. I do hope yours is less depressing. In the meantime, I am going to get out there and get down and dirty with all the other jobs that need doing.

1. Raking up all the fallen leaves carefully, as I know there are many little snowdrops just pushing their snouts up, and some are flowering already, but struggling to get above the leaves.

2. Cut back some of the old heavy leaves on the hellebores. You can find the flowers are struggling to get up to the light. Carefully lift the leaves from around the flowering stems.

3. Now is the time to finish pruning all the roses, whilst they are dormant. 4, February is also a good time to prune fruit trees, and if you are lucky enough to have apricots or peaches climbing up a warm wall, watch out for frost warnings. They often start flowering early, if it warms up, but a layer of fleece put over them would save the blossoms from being devestated. By the way, have you noticed the wonderful apricots trained up the cottages walls in Aynho?

This is also the best time to prune hedges, before the birds start nesting.
You can start chitting early potatoes now, if you have a warm, light place.
I like standing mine in open, old egg boxes on a windowsill.

7. Time to start cleaning up the flower beds. If you left stems for the birds to peck at seeds, they have probably had them all by now, so cut them back, and clear out any weeds, before any spring mulching with manure or compost. Better not to mulch if the soil is still heavy and soggy, but wait until is dries out a bit.

8. You can plant up pots with lilies, and gladioli now, and keep deadheading winter flowering pansies. It might be useful if you stock up with compost and vermiculite, before the busy planting time arrives. I plant my sweet peas gradually each month, and at the moment I am holding back waiting for the weather to warm up. Don't forget to set the mousetraps when you plant them. Tempt them with cheese, chocolate or peanut butter. (Dammit! Now I have just typed that I shall have to go and make my coffee and have a biscuit. Back in a minute.)



9. And its ladder time. Pruning the wisteria is essential. Be severe - cut back to just above two or three buds, be bold and go to the top of the ladder and cut out all the tall straggly stems that have reached the gutters, and please don,t fall off, we do not want any Whooooopsies..

10...Manly jobs that should be suggested are taking the lawnmower to be serviced – not needed until March, and giving garden paths are thorough sweeping so that they will not be slippery after a frosty night. Stay warm.

Sibford Photography Club is a friendly, informal group with a shared interest in photography. Activities include instructive presentations and regular photo topics with the resulting images presented and discussed at meetings (face to face or virtual).

At our meeting on 31st January, we will have a practical session creating images using cross-polarisation. This is a technique that exploits a property of clear plastic items such as disposable cutlery that light passing through them is twisted, due to the stresses created during manufacture. This can be seen as beautiful rainbow colours when they are placed on a polarised light source and viewed through a polarising filter. We will use this method to create colourful photographs of a range of small items. In addition to the practical session, we will also review members' images on the monthly topic of Frozen, a topic open to many interpretations for creative image-making. This meeting will be the first to be held in the small hall at Sibford Village Hall, which will be our venue from now on.

Our next meeting will be on 28th February, at 7:30 pm in the small hall at the Village Hall. Feel free to come along if you have an interest in any aspect of photography. During February, our members will be creating images on the topic Minimalism for review at the meeting.

Hackers Posing as Industry Regulators

According to the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), part of GCHQ, scammers are exploiting the cost of living crisis by posing as Britain's energy regulator, Ofgen. These criminal hackers will try to either infect devices with malware or trick users out of money on bogus websites.

One of the phishing scams flagged the most by members of the public is a message purporting to be from Ofgen regarding support with energy bills. One such message reads "GOVUK: we have identified you as eligible for a discounted energy bill under the Energy Bill Support Scheme. You can apply here: https:// reduce-myenergybill.com".

The NCSC state the most common scams are those that pose as the NHS, as criminals continue to exploit the pandemic.

Messages such as "NHS-UK Health Department: you've been in close contact with a confirmed Omicron case. You must book a PCR test kit".

As with the energy scam, ignore these pleas for your money.

The top half a dozen scams include TV Licensing, HM Revenue and Customs, the DVLA and the Gov.uk website.

Thanks to tips from the public, the NCSC claims to have removed more than 67,300 fake sites . (Torygraph Crime Correspondent).

On November 17th, 2022, Dr Gillian White gave us an enthralling talk on Elizabeth I's extraordinary 'Road to the Throne'. Elizabeth, the longest reigning Tudor monarch, came to the throne on 17 November 1558, 464 years previously, to the day.

Born in 1553 to Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn, her life began tragically. Although her father dandled her on his knee and was apparently very fond of her, he nonetheless had her mother beheaded' for treason' when Elizabeth was not yet three years old. As Henry continued to marry and lose or get rid of his subsequent wives, Elizabeth, astonishingly managed to thrive, and live a fairly happy childhood, learning to speak and write competently in five languages by the age of twelve.

Through twists of fate, namely the deaths of her two half -siblings, first Edward VI and then Mary, 'Bloody Mary', not forgetting the 9 -day reign of the hapless Lady Jane Grey, Elizabeth succeeded to the Throne, and thus embarked on her long and illustrious reign as the 'Virgin Queen'.


