It seems a long time ago now but back at the end of June Diana Thompson sent me some images of the brightly coloured Scarlet Tiger moth she had seen in her garden. This moth has spread throughout southern England since the

1990s. The caterpillars feed on comfrey and many other plants and the moths will fly by day or night. A similar species to look out for is the Jersey Tiger which has striped rather than spotted forewings. These are spreading from the London area. I have yet to see one, but one has been recorded in Long Compton recently.



I was very surprised to see a Buzzard sitting on our lawn one morning as it was just getting

light. I don't know what had attracted it to the garden, but it didn't hang around for long.

An insect that I saw for the first time recently was the distinctive Eared Leafhopper. Apparently, these are quite common but rarely seen as they are so well camouflaged when sitting on lichen covered tree-trunks.

Another insect to look out for are the bright yellow and black striped caterpillars of the Cinnabar moth which are often found feeding on Ragwort or occasionally Groundsel.

DID YOU KNOW?

The two Village Calendar photographs this month cover August and September and were taken by Barbara Foster and Maureen Hicks respectively. They were sponsored by Ann Woolgrove whose village business makes Custom Made Furnishings. Both pictures celebrate the grounds of the Village Hall which provide an outdoor amenity space come Rain or Shine! The August picture shows village families enjoying the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations while the September picture features the hardy souls who were determined to meet, despite the heavy rain, for 'Jazz in the Field' once Covid restrictions were lifted and we could meet together again with friends.



On the death of Frank Lascelles in 1934 villagers discovered that the Village Hall did not belong to them but was heavily mortgaged to Lascelles' estate. A committee under the chairmanship of Mr M R Lamb was set up to try to save the hall for the village but this failed so a fund was set up in the late 1930's



for a new village hall. The old hall was rented from the mortgagees and activities continued throughout WW2 with all proceeds going into the new hall fund. In 1947 the hall was demolished by Lascelles' estate creditors and Sibford was left without a village hall for 10 years. Some of the money raised was used by the Trustees to buy an acre of land within a field opposite the church. During the Korean War in the early 1950's all grant funding for community projects ceased but in 1954, under the chairmanship of Reginald Rowntree, and following an open village meeting, it was agreed to commission architects *Orrel H Nuttall and Lucas* to design a brick-built hall for community use. With some self-build help, the fine new Village Hall and grounds were opened in 1957 at a cost of some £275,000 in today's values.

In 1998 the Playgroup pressed the Village Hall Trustees for separate accommodation. The brief was 'To build an extension to the Village Hall and to alter the existing building with a view to improving the kitchen facilities, general storage space, and provide a centre for pre-school children'. The extension and hall improvements were opened in 2002. Since then, improvements have continued providing better insulation, eco-lighting and redecoration. We are indeed fortunate, that due to the stewardship of the Trustees since 1939 we have a first-rate facility for all users. Maureen Hicks



In Your Garden - September

Whist writing this in the middle of August I looked back at what I had written last year. It was all misery. The lawn was scorched brown, the flowerbeds looked scruffy and half dead, my lovely camellia had burnt brown leaves that looked like ginger biscuits, and I think we had a watering ban in place. But today – Wow! A rainbow of colour, as the phlox and asters compete against the roses and agapanthus, the lawn is a lush green and the waterbutts are full.

1. There will always be plenty of jobs, and the important one is to keep it all blossoming, so dead head every day, particularly the dahlias – they can keep going until the first frost.

2. Keep picking your beans, and tomatoes, and eat 'em, freeze'em, chutney 'em and store the apples away in a cool dry place. And of course, give some away to your friends and neighbours.

3. The clumps of iris need separating and replanting. Cut them right back to two or three inches of leaf, and plants them so that the top of the tuber is in the light – they like sunbathing.

4. Now that the lawns look good, make sure that the edges are trimmed, and have a look at the paths. They could probably do with a good brush up or even a power hose if you have one.

5. Autumn is the right time to plant new trees, shrubs and hedges, so that they stay well watered and can put down new roots before spring.

6. This is a good time to take half-hardy cuttings of perennials, like fuschias, verbenas, pelargoniums and salvias. Plant them in sandy, gritty compost, and keep in the greenhouse or on a windowsill.

7. Now is the time to trim all your hedges. The nesting season is over, and you need hedges to look trim during the winter.

8. It seems much to early to be telling you to clean out the greenhouse in order to bring in the tender treasures who need protection for the cold. I think we must just go by our instinct for the next couple of months, and enjoy the heat, summer puddings – yummmm – and evenings in the garden. If only the swifts and swallows would stay a bit longer.

9. All the garden magazines are nagging us all to put in our spring bulb order. I used to always do this sitting by the fire, with a nice glass of wine in the evening, but it feels a bit wrong to do it today. Right now I am in the shade of the magnolia, which is having a second flowering, trying to keep cool, and enjoying a Mini Magnum icecream.

10. If you want to have amaryllis and hyacinths ready to bloom at Christmas, and they make lovely presents, you are meant to have planted them into pots and bowls by the 24th September.

Just saying.

SIBFORDS HISTORY SOCIETY

On 20"July Jan Warner gave us a most fascinating talk on "The Survival of the Fittest; a brief history of child rearing", in which she vividly described the perils of being a baby during the past three centuries. It is something of a miracle that so many of our forebears survived the mishandling of their delivery into the world and the subsequent crazy methods that were used to get them through their early months and years. It was a spellbinding hour, and then there was the chance to look at the items from Jan's Infantalia collection, which illustrated the ignorance involved: babies drugged with 'soothing syrups', poisoned by lethal rattles and ribbons, and stabbed by pins – totally remarkable.

How lucky are the mothers of today! Many, many thanks to Jan for her wonderful talk.

On Wednesday 2^{α} August a coach whisked us away to the village of Kelmscott, "a heaven on earth". William Morris brought his wife Jane and his daughters to Kelmscott Manor in 1871, telling his mother it was "the loveliest haunt of ancient peace". All these years later, and following a sensitive and spectacular renovation project costing £6m, the place retains all the enchantment which attracted and inspired Morris.

The gardens were rain-soaked and filled with flowers, and the house is a treasure-trove of his and Dante Gabriel Rossetti's artworks, as well as furniture, textiles, carpets and ceramics. Our visit was managed efficiently, from the shuttle bus which met us at the car park, to the preliminary talk and the cream tea after the tour. We were divided into small groups and taken round the house by expert guides, where we had the chance to hear everything about the contents of the rooms, and to ask any questions – very impressive. Full marks to the Kelmscott team!

We are now looking forward to our next talk on 21st September, when Sibford resident Professor John Wass will speak about "Music and the Mind". Topics include absolute pitch, Mozart's father's habit of blowing his nose on A-sharp, areas of the brain involved in musical recognition, and related neurological diseases.

Doors open at the Village Hall at 7.15 pm and the talk begins at 7.30 pm. The cost for non-members is ± 3 . Refreshments will be served after the talk.

Horti visit to Kiftsgate garden 12th July 2023

The densely planted borders close to the house garden, looked stunning with many rare and unusual plants as well as the more familiar ones. For example, climbing up the cotswold stone wall of the house was a new plant to me, a schizophragma integrifolium. At first glance is looked like a climbing hydrangea, (hydrangea petiolaris) but it had the most lovely pure white bracts which made it look a bit like a climbing handkerchief tree. This stunning climber was planted more than 50 years ago and I am assured that it is completely hardy.

There are so many different areas to explore in the upper part of the garden that many of us spent all of our time there, whilst some of the more intrepid of our group braved the steep walk down to the quiet pool and up again, whilst pausing to enjoy glimpses of the fabulous views over to the Malvern Hills and beyond.

We all enjoyed tea and cake in the delightful tea room and most of us came home with a plant or two.

Like all great gardens, a visit to Kiftsgate is an enriching experience so if you haven't been this year, you might want to treat yourself.
