#### NATURE NOTES

Hedgehogs seem to be back in Sibford and well established now after many years when I am not aware of any sightings. Megan Gilkes found two hoglets in her garden recently. She is hoping to fatten them up to increase the chances of them surviving the Winter.

Back in April there were articles in the national press expressing concern over the British amphibian populations following last year's drought. Toads seem to have had a good year this year probably helped by the wet weather in July and August. One night driving back from Chipping Norton on a mild wet evening I must have seen at least a dozen on the road.

Less good news is the explosion in numbers of two introduced pest species. The Allium Leaf Miner is a species of fly that attacks members of the Allium family especially Leeks and Onions. I lost all my shallots this year and have had to harvest all my leeks early to try and salvage something before they rot.

The Box Tree Moth is a striking moth, but the larvae destroy Box trees and hedges. It was probably accidentally introduced to the UK from S.E. Asia in 2007 and was first recorded in Kent. It has spread rapidly. In some areas people are reporting hundreds caught in moth traps. In Sibford I recorded 1 in 2020, 1 in 2021, 3 in 2022 and 30 so far this year.

#### DID YOU KNOW?



#### Little London



This stone and rubble, thatched cottage, photographed by Bernie Jones, stands at the east end of Main Street in Sibford Ferris and is known as Little London. This name is often given to the last property in a village on the road towards the capital city. Originally two separate cottages, the

older part dates back to the 1500's. Some 100-200 years later the later built adjacent cottage on the village side, was joined to provide a single dwelling. The area between was infilled to provide extra living and bedroom space plus a new internal bathroom. Previously bathing would have been a tin bath in front of the fire and a privy in the garden would have served toilet needs and provided night soil for the garden. The outdoor privy would have been used until mains water and sewerage arrived in the village in the mid 1900's.

During restoration work carried out between 1998 and 2003, an Elizabethan silver sixpence, dated 1575, was found in the older part. It was common practice in the 16<sup>th</sup> century for the builder of a property to place a current coin of the realm in the house to bring luck to the new home. Similarly, a coin dated 1739 was found in the Inglenook fireplace in the newer cottage

In 1575 the land behind the cottage was an elm wood which may account for the elm boards that were found beneath the later added Victorian floorboards. During his restoration process Graham Piercy sourced a felled elm tree, had it planked and transported from Grantham to Sibford to reinstate the elm floors. Further sympathetic improvements and an extension have been added since the major restoration process.

The inviting footpath alongside Little London leads to farmland which stretches behind the cottage. This land used to provide allotments for Ferris villagers until they were incorporated and used for crop planting. The footpath bisects the field diagonally and leads to Folly Farm and Grange Lane providing access towards Swalcliffe Grange. *Maureen Hicks*

Remember to watch out for hedgehogs...

In Sibford Early Years we have been exploring a story all about a hedgehog looking for a home. We have also had numerous sightings of hedgehogs on site at Sibford School which is very exciting. To this end, we have created a hedgehog house in our wildlife area, following the instructions from the National History Museum (https://www.nhm.ac.uk/discover/how-to-make-a-hedgehog-house.html). At this time of year, hedgehogs may well be looking for a home so we thought we would try to help them.

In our class story the hedgehog made its home in a nice pile of leaves, so do remember when you are gardening (especially when using a trimmer) to look out for hedgehogs. Other tips from gardening world (<u>https://www.gardenersworld.com/plants/10-ways-to-help-hedgehogs/</u>) include not using slug pellets, checking bonfires, making small gaps in your fence, leaving out food/water like cat food (not milk/bread) and making a hedgehog house or feeding station.

If you find a sick or poorly hedgehog you can contact the RSPCA or Hedgehog Friendly Town in Stratford upon Avon. We have been raising money selling beetroot brownies, made using beetroot from our garden, to buy items to support Hedgehog Friendly Town.

SIBFORDS HISTORY SOCIETY

On  $21^{\text{H}}$  September John Wass gave a talk on one of his great loves – music – and took us from its origins up to the present day.

His quote from Schopenhauer summed up the content of the talk: "The inexpressible depth of music – so easy to understand and yet so inexplicable....."

He stated that music is fundamental in every culture, and that the progenitors of man, according to Darwin, charmed each other with musical notes and rhythms even before they had mastered speech.

John covered an astonishing amount of facts and topics, with reference to the greatest composers, the fate of the Castrati, aspects of musical memory including the Stuck Song Syndrome!, absolute pitch (Mozart had it but neither Wagner nor Schumann), and he concluded by mentioning how musical therapy is of great benefit to people with dementia and to calm anxiety in coronary heart disease and post-operative pain.

This short summary cannot possibly do justice to this excellent talk, and the number of people who had something to ask or say at the end was proof enough of our enjoyment.

Marjoram was another suggestion from Martin as a plant that has attracted numerous species to his garden this summer.

Looking ahead to November (and this may give you a sensation of deja vue) our last speaker of the year is the ever popular Timothy Walker who will be speaking to us on the subject of 'the shrunken garden. Moving and making a very small garden from scratch'

#### In Your Garden - November

Bonfire Night for me, always marks the end of the growing season, and its time to put the garden to bed. But don't think you can put your feet up yet, there are still plenty of jobs that need doing.

1. Pots of plants you are leaving outside need raising up on bricks, to stop them getting waterlogged, and put them in a sheltered place if possible, against a wall, or in the porch. Last winter was brutal, and killed off so many shrubs.

2. Plant your tulips now, as deep as possible. I have put some of mine into large pots, with a layer of little Narcissus called Tete a Tete. They flower before the tulips and look lovely with some little winter pansies popped around them.

3. Tidy up the borders, cutting back the perennials, and splitting up large clumps of Asters and Phlox.

4. Now that you have cleared your beans and peas, dig over the soil. The frost will help the soil to become less clumpy, and much finer when you come to raking and sowing it in the spring.

5.If it isn't frosty, now is a good time to plant bare-rooted roses. Give them a good soaking in a bucket before you plant them.

6. Mulch the dahlias if you are leaving them in the ground, otherwise lift them after the frost has blackened them, clean the tubers, and leave them in the greenhouse to dry out, then store away in boxes or deep trays under dry compost, and sand. They must stay in a frost free place.

7.Store your app[es carefully in a shed, but any that are showing signs of rotting must be taken out. Use them to make a delicious apple crumble. I like making my crumble topping with lots of broken ginger biscuits, added to the flour and butter, with some bits of preserved ginger chopped in as well.

8. As the hellebores start sending the little flower shoots up, cut away some of the large leaves around them, and they will shoot up and flower more happily, otherwise they are left crouching in the shadows. The Greeks used to use hellebores as a treatment for insanity. I understand they can be rather poisonous, but perhaps it was just a useful way to get rid of bonkers old relatives. And the Romans planted them near to their doors, to keep away evil spirits and witches. Maybe I will put a potfull of hellebores on my porch for Halloween night.

9.Remove fallen leaves away from little cyclamen, and rake all the leaves off the lawns and paths. You can compost them or put them in the bin, or on the bonfire, if you have one. But if any of your roses had blackspot this year – mine did – gather them up, and don't leave them lying around in the soil, as they will only come back again next year. I must remember to spray them early on next year.

10. The owls are hooting at night, the birds are flocking to the fatballs every day, and now it is time for you to sit down by the fire, perhaps with a glass of mulled wine, and browse through the catalogues dreaming and planning how your garden will look next year. Don't forget to check for hedgehogs before you light the bonfire. Have a jolly evening. Jupe Marshall



#### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

TV Police are warning of an increase in online shopping fraud on social media. There are two different scenarios taking place;

1. Victims are contacted by the suspects who show a real interest in the goods advertised, attending the address to look at the item with a view to purchase. The suspect will obtain the victim's bank details and show the victim their mobile phone showing that the payment has been made via the banking app – and then walk away with the goods. The banking app is of course a fake, as are the profile used and contact details.

2. The other type of offending is online shopping where the suspect agrees to purchase the item but will not pay for the goods until proof of purchase has been provided, The victim will arrange for the item to be sent by post and will provide the tracking number to the suspect. The suspect is then able to track or redirect the item. This results in the payment not being received and the item disappearing. The address to which the item is sent is either used for just a day, or the item is redirected to another address resulting in the loss of the item.

Remember, make reports of such scams to Action Fraud, online or telephone 0300 123 2040.

#### SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

#### Oxfordshire County Council 20mph Scheme

The Parish Council has applied to the Oxfordshire County Council 20mph scheme requesting that all roads currently 30mph in the parish be reduced to 20mph. This scheme has been offered to all parishes across Oxfordshire and will be consulted on and implemented if approved over the next 3 years.

#### White Lines painted on Main Street

Concerns were raised by parishioners about some new white lines painted on Main Street that suddenly appeared without any consultation beforehand and it was unclear what the purpose of these lines were. After much chasing of Highways by Cllr Jackie Noquet they advised that the lines were painted in error by Highways when the team leader of the relevant department was on annual leave. Due to Highways' limited budget for road marking and the cost of removing road markings Highways will not remove the lines and will just wait for them to fade in time. Highways have confirmed that they will repaint the 'Keep Clear' markings outside Ryehill Farm as requested by the Parish Council (What a total farce - Ed).

#### Town Estate Charity Trustee Nomination

The Town Estate Charity is a specifically Gower & Burdrop institution but much of the support it provides, particularly through its support for the school and the Village Hall, extends across the valley to embrace the wider community as a whole.

Sibford Gower Parish Council (PC) are required to nominate five trustees to the charity and the term of office for one of the existing PC nominees will end in November 2023 so the PC are now looking for a new nominee. In the first instance interested applicants should let the Council know in their own words their relationship with the village, and the skills, knowledge and experience they feel they would bring to the role. The Charity are particularly interested in applicants with the following skills or interests:

- a keen interest in the village primary school and be prepared to attend the meetings of its Governors
- knowledge or experience of estate management and farming
- involvement in or knowledge of the other village organisations, and ideas of where the Charity might usefully employ its resources for the benefit of the village generally or for those individuals or sections of the community that might be in particular need

• Should be able to attend at least 4 Trustee meetings each year and take an active part in the Charity's activities throughout the year.

#### DEFIBRILLATORS AND WHAT3WORDS





"What3words" (W3W) is a free web and phone app that gives a unique reference of three words to each 3 metre square on the planet's surface; for example Sibford Village Hall is located at "incursion.wheels.belt". It is useful for giving a very precise location in a way that can be quickly copied or read out with small chance of error. It thus differs from a post code, such as "OX15 5RW", which is very imprecise; it also differs from a latitude / longitude reference such as 52.03788degN, 1.482453degW which is precise but difficult to communicate correctly.

It is easy to see that in an emergency situation a W3W location reference could be very useful, especially in villages like the Sibfords where street addresses mostly lack numbers and can be hard to find.

The Emergency Services are aware of W3W and can identify the location of an emergency from its W3W reference. Open the W3W app on your phone and (if your phone has GPS) you will immediately see the three words for your location to read out to the operator. Why not write them down now and stick them on your fridge door?

In addition, if you are unsure of the location of the nearest defibrillator, the 999 operator may be able to give you its W3W reference to help you find it. The Sibford defibrillators are at incursion.wheels.belt (Village Hall) and recount.melts.reader (Sibford School Swimming Pool). Tim Huckvale
