#### NATURE NOTES

According to the BTO Blackbird numbers have been particularly low in gardens during the Autumn this year. This may be due to poor breeding success and a plentiful supply of food in hedgerows. The birds also are more timid when they are moulting. Numbers in gardens should increase in the Winter months as wild food becomes less plentiful and migrant birds from the continent start to arrive.

Following my comments on an increase in Hedgehog numbers in the Sibfords it has been pointed out that hedgehog road casualties are also now occurring again. Driving with an awareness of wildlife (and other road users) is so important now with more and more traffic on the roads.

Colin Lamb observed a number of Red Kites and Buzzards feeding on worms in the stubble fields bordering Woodway Road. The worms were probably brought to the surface following a period of heavy rain and were visible to the birds after the crops had been harvested.

In October I recorded a Radford's Flame Shoulder in my garden moth trap. These are migrant moths which are normally recorded on the South coast and rarely make it this far north. My record is probably the first for Oxfordshire.

## SIBFORDS HISTORY SOCIETY

In October Dr Gillian White presented "Bess of Hardwick Hall," providing a lively overview of Bess's tumultuous life, marked by early marriages, financial challenges, and eventual wealth and power. The presentation delved into the architectural and historical richness of Hardwick Hall, a fine example of Elizabethan creativity. Married at 14, widowed at 17, Bess went on to have three more husbands, ultimately achieving significant affluence that allowed her to construct Hardwick New Hall in 1590. Gillian's vivid portrayal of the hall's treasures stirred interest among attendees, prompting consideration of a group visit; an idea which we'll develop in the New Year.

In November Tim Healey told us about the historical significance of Drovers' roads, where livestock were herded from Welsh pastures to London Markets, up to the early 20th century. Evidence of drovers' routes lie in placenames such as "Little London", "Cold Harbour" and "Drovers Arms". One of the many surprises in the talk was that "Little London" may derive not from a connection to the capital city but from the old word "utlenden", meaning "outsider". Mostly speaking only Welsh, drovers made use of wide tracks and wastelands to camp on and feed their animals. Still to be seen are the groups of Scots Pines that they planted to mark resting places for the next generation of drovers. We also learned about turnpikes, early banking, and the ability of drovers' dogs to find their own way home once the livestock was sold.

We are all looking forward to Christmas here at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School and have begun to develop ideas for our contribution to this year's Christmas tree festival at the church.

The children love to be involved in community events and everyone enjoyed the school Harvest Festival celebrations when we were able to join with friends and family at the church. We are very grateful to Barbara Foster and her colleagues for their warm welcome on a chilly Autumn morning.

As part of our preparation for this event, we explored how harvest time has changed because of developing technology and the impact this has had on community life in the villages. The children were interested to learn how historically, everyone, including the children from the school, would have been involved in bringing in the crops, whereas much of this is now managed by huge machines and a much smaller work force. Our children are always very interested in local history and their connection with it. We are looking forward to welcoming Barbara Foster into school to talk about 'A War Time Christmas' with our older children and to explain the meaning of a Christingle and demonstrate how to make a christingle in a whole school assembly. This will link beautifully with the children's history curriculum and R.E. lessons.

We are planning to run some poetry workshops for the children in school, partly inspired by their love of poetry and story. ## DID YOU KNOW?

## **Holy Trinity Church**



The final photograph in this year's Village Calendar features the Parish Church in Sibford Gower. Taken by a drone when the church roof was being inspected, the picture was submitted by Rev. Neil Bowler. The final three months were kindly sponsored by Alan Berks who supplies hay, straw and manure locally.

The King's Commissioners visited the

Sibfords during the Reformation and in 1547 reported 'an ancient church which had fallen into decay', but no site or remains have ever been found. This early chapel may have been used by priests who travelled between villages and who were paid by wealthy patrons to say prayers for their deceased relatives.

Until 1840 the Sibfords did not have an Anglican parish church but were part of the ecclesiastical parish of Swalcliffe (1.5 miles east of Sibford) and all services, including burial, took place there. Holy Trinity Church was built by grant and public subscription to provide 500 seatings, 340 of which were free forever. The design was by H J Underwood of Oxford, and the land was donated by Rev William Wilkes in 1839 and was consecrated for use in 1840. It has a spacious feel under its roof which was restored in 2000. Built in the shape of the Cross it does not have a separate chancel but has some fine pews and choir stalls built by local craftsmen.

The single manual organ was also erected by public subscription in 1906. Made by

Jacksons of Oxford it was dedicated by the Bishop of Oxford. The leaded-light windows in both the chancel and the nave are arranged in groups of three, representing the Holy Trinity. Some of the windows display excellent examples of Victorian and Edwardian stained glass. These illustrate bible stories and events and some are dedicated memorial windows.



Surrounded by its burial grounds, Holy Trinity Church is situated within the farming countryside and stands in the heart of the village community it serves.

## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Just a gentle pre - Christmas reminder of the most popular scam phone calls;

- 1 **Unpaid bill scam.** You receive a call from a 'BT (EE) engineer 'saying that you owe them money and that they are going to cut off your phone. The call usually comes out of office hours you are asked for credit card details etc.
- 2. **Investment scam.** This one takes time as they are happy to chat about your investments (stocks and shares details are available on a public share register). Then one evening they will ring you with 'an exceptionally exciting opportunity but you have to act fast and make an immediate decision'.
- 3. **Computer Virus.** You are contacted by one of the big organisations perhaps claiming to be Microsoft, advising you that they have detected a virus on your machine.' Are you sitting at your machine? ...all you need to do is down load some free software and all will be well.'
- 4. **Lottery/competition.** You've won! (even without taking part), but there is an administration fee which needs to be paid before your prize can be claimed.
- 5. **Courier scam.** Caller says they are from your bank and someone has been fraudulently using your card. They ask you to hang up and dial another number. They will send a Taxi/courier to collect your card.

If it feels wrong, it probably is. Keep calm and just hang up.

Take some of your favourite plants with you

Make a plan and list all your plants

Incorporate a pond with native plantings to encourage and support wildlife (waterlilies

need a water depth of 2ft)

Copper pots deter slugs

He strongly recommend David Goulson's book 'the garden jungle' describing ways to encourage wildlife into the garden

## In Your Garden - December

Last winter was such a cruel one, such hard frosts, so I hope we are better prepared this year. Load up with loads of woolly jumpers and and hats, and I have discovered that my car has a heated drivers seat, and a heated steering wheel. Bliss. But it is our plants that need looking after, as I lost most of my geraniums last year, so:-

If the cost of heating the greenhouse is too much, bring all your tender plants into the house, and load up the windowsills. Plants left in the greenhouse can be covered with fleece, or hessian, but should always be kept on the dry side.

Keep raking up the leaves, and I did it gently where I knew little snowdrops are planted, and – lovely surprise, there were a couple of them just opening, and I'm writing this in the middle of November. Primroses, polyanthus are beginning to show some colour as well. The best flowering bulb at the moment is the brilliant pink Nerine, which is nestled against a sheltering south wall, and also a group of brilliant yellow Sternbergias.

Dig up any veggies still in the ground and store them, then dig over that patch, and leave it so that the frost can break it up.

Make sure the paths and steps are brushed clean of leaves and moss. They can get so slippery and dangerous, particularly on those dark nights if you are just walking back from a jolly party in your high heeled shoes.

Once they have dropped all their leaves, it is a good time to prune apple and pear trees. After Christmas you can prune back red and black currants, and gooseberry bushes. But don't do it when there are hard frosts.

If you have time on your hands, and want to get out of the house, you could brush out the garden shed, and wipe clean all the spades, trowels and forks, then hang them up tidily. Really good gardeners wash out all their flowerpots too. Really! I don't know how they find the time.

Don't knock yourself out with too many garden jobs, we all have our hands full making mince pies and Christmas cakes, doing presents, writing cards, — and this year I must walk around the village delivering them all. The price of stamps is ridiculous. I can have a very big grumble about all that, but I won't. Just wish you all a very Happy Christmas.



## In Your Garden - January

And then it is January:-

Enjoy the scented flowers of Mahonia, Sarcococca, Daphnes and Hellebores. The latter should have all the large leaves cut off so that they flower better if the sun gets to them.

Time to spread some compost or manure on the rhubarb, and then cover them with a forcing pot, or an upturned bucket will do.

Any plants in pots outside need to be raised up on bricks or stones, so that they never stand in water. Cold, wet roots will die if they get frosted. Place them against a wall, or in the porch, for more protection.

You can start planting sweet peas inside, and if you have a warm greenhouse you can also start some early spinach, lettuce and broad beans.


If we have some heavy snow this year, (and I'd love to get back on my sledge and whizz down a hill) don't leave the snow on the branches of shrubs, or they will snap under the weight. Give them a gentle shaking to clear them.

Always lots to do, but the pressure is off. Time to sit by the fire, with a mulled wine, and the last of the mince pies, eat up bits of cold turkey, finish the cake, and browse your way through seed catalogues, and order lots of beautiful plants. Happy New Year to all my lovely gardening friends.

## SIBFORD PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

At our meeting on 28th November, we had a practical session on using the settings for aperture, shutter speed and ISO to make creative images. By creative images, I mean ones where the shutter speed has been set to a value that allows you to create your chosen effect. For example, if you want to photograph a waterfall with smooth white streaks where the water is falling, you would need to use a slow shutter speed, whereas if you wanted to show it with every drop crisp and sharp, you would need a very fast shutter speed. Achieving these shutter speeds requires changes to the aperture and/or the ISO setting, which were explained during the session.

We also enjoyed members' images on the monthly topic of "Paint", with a great selection of well-observed photos.

There will not be a meeting in December, so there will be two meetings in January, one on 2nd and one on the 30th.

Sibford Photography Club is a friendly, informal group with a shared interest in photography. Activities include instructive presentations and regular photo topics with the resulting images presented and discussed at meetings (face to face or virtual). In addition to our regular meetings, we also arrange outdoor photoshoots at local nature reserves and other places of interest.


