Sibford Swifts



The first swift of the season returned to our colony in Mannings Close on Bank Holiday Monday, 6 May. By the following Sunday all four pairs had returned, although some of them did not roost every night.

Swifts pair for life but only spend time together for breeding, so when the later swift of a pair returns there is often a short period of squabbling as they try to work out if the other is their partner or an intruder into their nest site. The pair in box #4 fought on and off for about an hour before they settled down to some mutual preening. They have since turned out to be the most devoted couple, spending more time together in their box than the other pairs – and producing our first egg on 16 May, and a second on 18 May.



NATURE NOTES

During early May everything has become very green with all the trees and hedges coming into leaf.

I was wondering why I had not heard the Tawny Owls until quite late in the year but once they started hooting, they could be heard throughout the day.

I have had one report of a Cuckoo being heard in the area this year. Almost certainly a migrant passing through.

Life in our small garden pond is thriving. Particularly noticeable has been the number of small Damselflies. I must try to identify what species are present.



Hares have been seen in the fields around the villages and some young hares have been seen nearer to buildings than would normally be expected.

Looking at the national results of the Big Garden Birdwatch I was surprised to see that Starlings are at number 4 in England. They used to be common in our garden, but I only remember seeing one over the last 6 months.

Another species that used to be common but is now in serious decline is the Small Tortoiseshell Butterfly. Last year saw the lowest numbers recorded since monitoring began 48 years ago with a decline of 86%. A good reason to leave some nettles which the caterpillars feed on and reduce pesticide use in the garden to an absolute minimum.

On the night of the aurora many people who run moth traps reported very low catches. My own moth numbers reduced from 50 two nights before to 13 with otherwise similar weather conditions. However, my 13 did include a rather nice Puss moth. (pictured)





DID YOU KNOW?



D-DAY 1944

On 5th June 1944, eighty years ago and after long months of preparation, Britain's Armed Forces and their Allies were ready to invade northern France by embarking on the largest naval, air and land operation in history. The plans to invade Europe were successfully kept secret to provide an element of tactical surprise. However, stormy weather conditions delayed the start of operations by one day but in the early hours of 6 June massed airborne and amphibious landings put 156,000 allied troops on the beaches in Normandy. Some 11,000 aircraft were mobilised to provide air cover to support the invasion. Within a few days about 326,000 troops, more than 50,000 vehicles and some 100,000 tons of equipment had landed in France, a bridge head was established and the battle to repel the occupying German troops had begun.



People living in southern Britain became aware of the preparations as men, military vehicles and armaments began to be brought nearer to the south coast. Even the Sibfords played their part. Older villagers can remember collections of shell cases being stacked along the roadside on the Hook Norton Road from Sibford Ferris towards the Gate Hangs

High. They were picked up by military vehicles as they made their way to the south coast. They were well spaced so that if a stray bomb destroyed one pile, they would not affect others. Tanks and other military vehicles were parked along lanes and roads throughout the southern counties and troop camps were set up. American troops were in camp in both Hook Norton and Moreton-in-Marsh prior to D- Day.

Sadly, the human cost on June 6th was 4414 lives lost (fewer than predicted) with many thousands more injured or missing. On this 80th anniversary we remember all those who played their part in changing the course of the Second World War. The Sibfords will be joining with the Nations Tribute to the men and women of D-Day – do join the planned events. *Maureen Hicks*

In Your Garden - June

One of the loveliest things about the gardens at this time of year is the early mornings – going out there barefoot, the dew on the grass washing your toes and the birds trilling away so happily. The garden has become to look very full of colour, no bare earth, and all the plants justling each other for space. Trees and shrubs are now in full leaf, and Midsummer will soon be here. So don't stay in bed with your cup of tea, get outside, very early, and feel the magic. Then get on with all these jobs;-

1. Finish planting up your pots and hanging baskets. There are still loads of lovely plants to buy, particularly at Quarry Nurseries.

2. If you planted spinach and radishes last month, they may need thinning out a bit. French and runner beans, and peas, can all be planted now, and strawberries and raspberries will need cover with some netting, to stop the birds from stealing them all.

3. Alliums have seeded themselves all over my garden, and look lovely, but even whilst they are flowering the leaves around them go yellow, dried and messy. I learned from the marvellous two elderly ladies who looked after Sissinghurst garden for so many years, that it is the right thing to do, by removing these messy leaves, and it all looks so much nicer. We remove leaves from around the hellebores when they are flowering too, don't we.

4. Blackspot is starting on the roses, and greenfly too, so keep an eye on them, and spray them at once. Do not let the leaves lie around under the plant either, and don"t put them in the compost.

5. When your tulips have finished flowering carefully lift them up and shake the soil off. Put them on a shelf to dry out completely, then store them away to replant next year. They do not always flower again, but plenty of them will. I put mine in a spare bit of soil in the veg plot, and keep them there to use for cutting next spring.

6. Hedges that need cutting at this time of the year are Privet, Beech, Photinia and Yew, but please check that there are no bird's nests in them first. You can still plant new container grown hedges, as long as you keep them very well watered.

7. It is time for the Chelsea Flower Show, and that means doing the Chelsea chop. It really does make a difference to flowers that are shooting up very fast, and cutting back about half of them will make them continue growing and blooming for far longer.

8. Try sowing a mixture of Little Gem lettuces, Rocket, Lambs Lettuce etc. These can give you enough salads to see you through the summer, and I like having a couple of pots of small tomatoes, little red ones called Gardeners Delight. So nice to have something to pop into your mouth as you go around weeding and watering.

9 Lawns now need mowing regularly, and keeping the edges trimmed is as necessary as a good hair cut. Flopping bits of grass hanging into the flowerbeds just make the whole place look neglected.

10. June has to be one of the best months of the year in the garden. Yes, there is lots of work keeping the beds weed-free, propping up and staking tall plants as they shoot up, dead heading constantly, but do take time off to go and visit loads of other gardens. So many open up in June for the NGS, and be proud of your own garden, and enjoy it as well. Try flopping into a comfy chair, with your feet up, and perhaps a fruity glass of Pimms? Absolutely!

On May 16th, Bill King brought to light the work of the British Resistance Organisation 1940-45 in his talk on "Dad's Underground Army". Bill started his research into the Auxiliaries in 1977, and is an absolute expert on the subject. His talk was gripping, from the introduction where he portrayed the start of World War II, to the very real fear of a Nazi invasion and the steps to be taken to slow down and botch the advance of the enemy. Patrols of seven men were at the ready all over the country, heavily concentrating on the South and around Hull. These men were sworn to secrecy and prepared to give their lives, as they most certainly would have done, had the invasion taken place. The men were trained at Coleshill and the ladies at Hannington Hall, both near Highworth in Wiltshire.

The Coleshill Estate, now owned by the National Trust, invites visitors to discover the Hidden World War II History, with Bill and his wife Flora leading tours into the Home of the British Resistance. Another trip for us to plan?

You are asked to click onto a link which turns out to be a phishing website etc, etc. Do not click on the link – forward the text to 7726.

2.Older (that's us) holiday makers. Beware fake adverts on Facebook and Instagram claiming to offer free travel insurance. Fraudsters claim that under a new Government initiative over 55s qualify for free insurance. Rubbish. Don't.

3. Again, Facebook and Instagram users should beware a series of scam adverts which use TV host Alison Hammond's image, claiming to reveal the secrets of the host. (These thieves also occasionally impersonate the BBC and ITV for credibility). Once again you are directed to a dodgy retail website etc,etc.

Items 2 and 3 can both be reported by selecting the three dots to the right of the post and pressing 'report'.
