SIBFORD SWIFTS



Writing this in the middle of June, we are now watching 6 chicks being fed with 2 eggs remaining to hatch. These counts are well down on last year, when by this time we had 12 chicks, the maximum we could expect in our four boxes. However, it is still possible that the first swift to return this season could, after 6 weeks as a singleton in box #1, find a partner and start a brood. [18 June: Stop Press! – it did not roost alone last night!]

There was a bit of drama on 22nd May when an intruder entered box #4. There was a big fight which ended with the intruder being seen off, but the experience seemed to confuse the resident pair in some way, because that evening they ejected two of their three eggs from the nest. Remarkably, the next morning another egg was laid, and this and the egg that had remained in the nest have now hatched. As you can see in the picture the two chicks are very different in size, having hatched four days apart, but the smaller one has so far survived a week so must be getting some share of the food. NATURE NOTES

The red damselfly that I mentioned in the previous Nature Notes has now been identified as the Large Red Damselfly. This is the commonest of the red damselflies but it is still nice to see them doing so well in a small garden pond.

There are lots of fledgling garden birds around at present with Gold Finches and Green Finches bringing their young to the bird feeders. Blackbirds and Robins continue to feed their young even when they have left the nest.

Mike and Penny Spring sent me a photo of a moth found in their utility room which I was able to identify as a Scarlet Tiger.

Harry Berks has contributed a number of observations accompanied by some supporting photos. These include American Signal Crayfish at Lamb's Pool, Smooth Newts in the Sibford Gower Pond, Geese with their goslings and a Chiffchaff that was very vocal near the bench at the end of Lamb's Pool. However, the most exciting of his observations was a Hobby that he saw and photographed just outside the village. These birds are summer visitors to the UK coming here from Africa in order to breed. They are incredibly agile flyers feeding on insects, especially dragonflies and small birds including swifts and swallows that they catch in flight.

Outdoor Learning Fun: We are always trying to improve the learning environment for our children to keep it fresh, interesting and engaging. We have recently purchased some new outdoor equipment for our youngest children to support active play and turntaking in their outdoor learning space. SUNEDAY SMALLHOLDING

Alan delivers eggs

Alan is a five year old Toggenburg goat. I had wanted to keep goats for some time and thought a milking breed would be best. Before buying my first two females I went on a cheesemaking course which helped me to focus my mind on the reasoning for getting goats. I also researched breeds and came across the Toggenburg Breeders Society. Through the society I received a lot of help and support in getting started. My first two goats arrived, Sofie and Rosie. They went to the billy goat the following autumn and my first kidding happened in May 2019. Alan was born as one of a set of triplets. Milking the goats was fine once I had got the technique right and the goats got used to it. I chose to bottle feed Alan from the start while his sisters went on their mother after I had milked Alan's share. A bond soon built between us and when a decision had to be made on his future it was clear that he had to find a job if he wanted to stay.

I thought initially that a harness would allow him to pull a cart and so began searching the internet for help which led me to join the Harness Goat Society. Here I could read member's stories and see goats in action. I did get Alan started on pulling a log around but quickly the focus changed to moving eggs rather than wood! I already had an egg round running for my village and the idea of Alan carrying the eggs led me to make a simple pack saddle which I could fix my bicycle panniers to. In no time at all, Alan was walking alongside me with full panniers of eggs and the egg delivery took on a very special and unique quality. I was satisfied that I had saved Alan from the butcher and in turn he was doing a job which helped the smallholding.

All was going well until I decided one day to walk Alan back a different way, through a different field but one with a footpath. The footpath was good, but there were two horses in the field – which was bad. The horses took an instant dislike to Alan and attacked him. It was a terrible ordeal, being chased around the field by a kicking and biting, rearing and stamping horse was terrifying. Alan escaped the attack by sheer chance as I could not control the horses to help him. Haven fallen to the ground, half sliding – half rolling, he squeezed under the fence. He got up and although shaken seemed to have no injuries, just a slight limp. We got home and Alan had some time off. He does now still walk to the village but completes a reduced egg round.

Recently, a journalist working for BBC's Farming Today on radio 4 was searching through the Harness Goat Society website for an example of a working goat and found Alan. The story of Alan's egg round was cheerful, lighthearted and amusing, leading to a flurry of interest from other radio stations; Radio Ulster, Times Radio and Heart, and Channel 5 News and BBC South on TV. Alan has always been well known in Sibford, but now people across the world are hearing about him.

Last week I met with Annette from The Harness Goat Society. She has generously given me her goat harness. ...next job is to make a cart and train up Boris! Sue Sabin

May is the time of year when flowers bloom, birds sing and Sibford Ferris Parish Council update you on all the things we have done for you over the past year! One year ago we celebrated the coronation of King Charles with a street party which was funded in part by the Council and organised by it with a wonderful team of local volunteers. It was a great success and a sunny day that we will all remember for a long time.

The Elm crossroads became a local black spot with accidents occurring regularly. Greatly concerned by this we chased OCC to supply 4 new larger signs which are now installed and road lines repainted. We continue to get litter and fly tipping removed from the area too.

We have communicated with CDC and our local District Councillor and politicians regarding planning matters and have done our best to voice the concerns of the community over speculative development. We are saddened that once again the decision of one inspector can over turn the strong and well founded objections from Cherwell District Council, SFPC and the whole community.

We have continued to press for the re-categorisation of our village in order to try to prevent further expansion of the village boundaries with more development with even more traffic.

Over the summer we plan to get a new play park installed in Cotswold close and have been working to get quotes that fit with our budget. We also secured £12,000 in funding for this.

I have met with the new headmistress of Sibford school, Rebecca Evans, who has expressed her desire to maintain good relations between the village and the school.

Defibrillator training continues free of charge and co ordinated by one of our Council members.

We carefully manage the Council finances and assets and actively work to protect the conservation area. Also in a bid to slow the traffic we have applied for 20 mph signs.

These are just a-few of the many areas that our small Parish Council cover and I would like to express my gratitude to Councillors Andrew Meyler, John Wass, Ginny Bennett and Michael Gordon for all their voluntary work on the Sibford Ferris Parish Council and to our wonderful clerk Kirsty and the community for supporting us.

In Your Garden - July/August

I am writing this in the middle of June, well wrapped up in jumpers and warm trousers, wondering if summer will ever come. However the garden seems to have enjoyed the soaking wet spring, and everything is looking tall and fairly robust. But the north wind is blowing all the petals off the roses, and the delphiniums need more stakes to stop them being blown over. So that will be the first job I think:-

- 1. Drive more firm stakes into the dahlias and delphiniums, and the tallest phlox, and tie them together with string, and any climbing roses that have started flapping in the wind, need tying back to the wall. They can be cut back when they stop flowering.
- 2 Weeds, weeds are shooting up in some impossible places to reach. Try and get a hoe to them, and bindweed is having a party romping through my hydrangeas, and its very difficult to get underneath and get the roots out. Trouble is if they reach the flowers they tend to tie them into a bunch together.
- 3.Lavender tends to get rather scraggy and leggy as it gets older. Give them a hard trimming after they have flowered, and if you take cuttings they grow quickly, so you can replace the rotten ones. It isn't just age that makes them look scruffy, if you have romping dogs, little boys and footballs going into them!
- 4. If you are going away on holiday, leave potted plants tucked into a shady wall, so that they don't get too scorched in the greenhouse, and with a saucer of water underneath them. If we get very hot weather you should water the plants early in the morning, and last thing at night.
- 5. Now is the time to enjoy harvesting your fruit and salads. Once your potatoes have finished flowering, they should be ready to dig up. If they are still too small, earth them up a bit. You can now do new sowings of carrots, lettuces and spinach, to keep you going through the autumn.
- 6. Its really important to keep deadheading everything, do it every day, pick the sweet peas too, as once they start making seed pods, they will stop flowering.
- 7. Trim the hedges towards the end of the month, and check that any new young trees and shrubs have not dried out, and their ties to the stakes are not too tight.
- 8. Alchemilla mollis is so useful lining paths and edging borders, but by now it gets scruffy, and starts seeding itself all over the place. Give it a rather brutal cut back, and in two or three weeks it will have fresh new growth bursting through.
- 9. If you are growing tomatoes they need to have regular watering and feeding. Remember to pinch out all the side shoots, and keep them tied gently to their stakes.
- 10 And a warning to you all to make sure that the lovely trailing plants that wander over the paths can be lethal. There are two very nice people in my village who have tripped over, and broken hips and shoulders, ending up in hospital for weeks. Be careful dear gardeners, and let us hope we finally have a warm, calm, beautiful summer soon.

DID YOU KNOW?



Returning to the stained-glass windows in Holy Trinity Church we take a closer look at the three south facing stained glass panels on the right of the chancel. They are all about Baptism.

The central panel in the south window features Jesus' own Baptism by John the Baptist in the River Jordan and the text

reads: "This is My Beloved Son" confirming that Jesus was indeed the Son of God - the long-awaited Messiah.





At the base of this window is a memorial inscription dedicated to members of the multigenerational Pettipher family who were farmers in Sibford Ferris and served the village community in many different ways.

The window to the right

of the central panel depicts Nicodemus coming to Jesus by night and Jesus explaining to him that you have to be born again, spiritually not physically, so making it clear that baptism is a new birth. The text reads: "Except a man be born of water and of the spirit he cannot enter the Kingdom of God."





The images in the window on the left-hand side are less certain but are thought to represent Abraham being visited by three strangers, three men, while he was out in the countryside. A further reference possibly to the three 'persons' of the Holy Trinity. The inscription reads: "Three men stood by thee."



- 2. To organise talks, entertainment and events as required by the majority of members
- 3. To raise money for the efficient running of the Club

They met in the village hall, but it seems the hall was cold, so for a while they met in LISTER common room at the Sibford Friends School Sometime during 1984–1985 they came back to the village hall. There was a connection with Age Concern but due to a "dispute" the club went on alone, with an elected committee to run it. This continues today. Nowadays members come from all over Banbury, Epwell, Brailes and Tysoe. Anyone over 50 can join the club.





CAESAR SALAD



Ingredients

500g 1/2" cubes of bread juice of 2 lemons

1 clove of garlic 100 ml olive oil

2 heads romaine lettuce 2g dry mustard

2 egg yolks black pepper

250g parmesan cheese s&p

Method

Over a low heat, fry the bread in olive oil and a split clove of garlic

Into a garlic-rubbed wooden bowl tear the lettuce and sprinkle with the mustard, s&p and the parmesan. Dress with the lemon juice and 85g olive oil

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



One or two different scams this month – each with the same intention to steal your personal data and dosh.

- 1. Mobile phone crime. Our phones are stuffed with personal information which can provide thieves with the keys they need to access your online banking and allow them to raid your account(s). Thieves don't just steal your phone in the hope of selling it on for a few quid in the local pub, but now see it as a source of greater riches. The Halifax Bank, for example, is now strongly advising customers against storing online banking login details on a mobile phone.
- 2. Door scammers. There have been a growing number of cases whereby the scammer turns up wearing a hi-vis jacket and knocks politely on your door (rather than breaking in). They come up with a number of tales based around home improvements for example, your house was built in the 1970s and needs modern insulation, or your gutters are blocked and "we've just cleaned your neighbours' gutters, can we do yours?". The scammers will always ask for cash upfront and the amount often increases as time goes by. If you are not expecting callers, don't engage with them, don't let them in. If they won't go away, call the police.
- 3. Cryptocurrency scams. The old Top Gear team (Clarkson, Hammond and May) have found out that their images are being used (deepfaked!) by scammers trying to sell cryptocurrency online. Clarkson's response was "I don't even know what cryptocurrency is. But it sounds ghastly." May went along the lines of "it's all bo---cks", and Hammond's response is unprintable. I'm with Clarkson, but if you do know something about these things, just be careful.
- 4. Solar panels. Scam emails are appearing asking recipients to check their eligibility for funding to cover the upfront costs of installing such panels. The links are entirely fraudulent and should be avoided. Please forward the email to 'report@phishing.gov.uk.'
