

NATURE NOTES

After my comments about the low numbers of wasps around this year a few more have appeared but certainly not in the numbers seen in some years.

Some wasps have been flying around and presumably eating some of the caterpillars of the Large White butterfly on my brassica plants. This particular species seems particularly abundant this year!

Andrew Tindsley has sent me some phots he has taken of an Elephant Hawk-moth caterpillar. These feed on willowherb and in gardens they will also eat fuschia. They are large striking caterpillars with prominent eyespots to deter predators. They are often seen at this time of the year when they are ready to pupate. Andrew also commented that although he had seen few House Martins and Swallows this year they have obviously been around as by late August they could be seen gathering on telegraph wires ready for their flight south for the winter.



Fiona Pigeon managed to photograph a Sparrow Hawk eating a pigeon on the grass verge opposite the village shop.

I have heard a lot of Red Fox screaming in the early hours just before dawn. This sound is often heard in the mating season in January and February but at this time of the year is probably male foxes establishing their territory.

Other loud wildlife heard recently include Green Woodpeckers and a Raven that was probably being bothered by Carrion Crows,

In Your Garden - October

Autumn is on its way, and these cold, misty mornings can be a bit depressing, but just wait until the trees turn glorious colours, and even more bright berries dangle from the hedges. I love walking through a wood, and hearing the leaves crunching under my boots. Still loads of jobs to do though.

1. Keep dead heading the roses, and some of the annuals are still blooming away, so keep giving them the snip too.

2. When the hostas start dying back, dig them up, or tip them out of their pots, and divide them up. They are tough, and will be very crowded, so you may have to take a knife to cut through the roots. And then you will have masses more to plant out in the shady places. Mine have been horribly munched by slugs this year.

3. Garden pots that you filled with colour in the spring, are looking tired and miserable now, but there are plenty of colourful winter and spring plants ready to use instead now. Wallflowers are great, and primulas, violas, and bulbs of daffodils and crocus, and a bit later on the gorgeous Bellis Perennis.

4. If you need to move any shrubs, do it now whilst the soil is still warm – hopefully – but if they are tender wait until spring. Always keep them well watered.

5. Perennials, like Asters, that have grown too large, can be split up now into two or three new ones, and replanted, BUT before you do it, carefully label them, so that you will remember what colour, and if they are very tall, for the back of the border, or very short, for nearer the front. And use a label with a good pen called a Sharpie, that doesn't fade off. I have made this mistake too often, dear friends, so learn from me!

6. And it's time to start bringing into the greenhouse all your tender precious plants. And you will have remembered to have cleaned your greenhouse first, haven,t you? Well I have only just done mine, and it took all day. You have to move out any plants in there, then brush down the benches, on the top, and creeping down under too. That is where most of the spiders and bugs, and larvae are hiding. Then get the hose and give it all a huge squirting, getting into all the corners you couldn't quite reach, and wipe down the glass. Leave it to dry out for an hour, whilst you recover with a bowl of soup, then back to putting all the pots back in. Broken fingernails, backache, wonky knees – it is all worth it!

7. As the leaves start to fall, rake them up and either load them onto the compost heap, or fill up big, black sacks with them, and puncture lots of holes in the sack. They will rot down faster if they are damp.

8. The lawns will still need a cut, and if you have the time, and energy, aerating them will improve it enormously. You can also sprinkle some grass seed if it has got worn away in places, or if the dog has been digging it up.

9. My camellia is starting to show little buds forming, and as it grows in a pot it needs feeding. A good damp leafmould mulching through the winter will help it.

10. Always remember that this is your garden, and you can leave it to snooze quietly through the winter, let the weeds grow, just watch the birds feeding, and wait for the joyous moment when the first snowdrop bursts through the soil. You don't have to listen to old bossy boots. Jupe Marshall

Norman Manors in the Sibfords (2)

In the same way that, King William conferred lands in the Gower and Burdrop to his faithful knights Grantmesnil and Corbucion, the Manor and land in Sibford Ferris or Little Sibford was given to Henri de Ferrieres. Henri was born in Ferrieres-St-Hilaire, Eure, Normandy, and is thought to have fought at the Battle of Hastings. Following the conquest, King William 1 conferred extensive lands, including a Manor and land in Sibford Ferris. It is thought that the Ferris Manor may only have been used as a hunting lodge and not as a residence for the Ferrieres family. Ownership passed from Henri de Ferrieres through his sons until 1138 when Henri's third son, Robert, was created Earl of By now the family name had changed to de Ferrers and Robert confirmed the Derby. grant of the Ferris manor to the Knights Templar. Following the suppression of the Templars by the Pope in 1312, all land in their ownership was passed to the Hospitallers and subsequently reverted to the Crown in 1540. Together with the Hospitaller's lands in Sibford Gower (which did not include the Gower and Burdrop Manor and lands), the combined manors were sold in 1542 to Sir Thomas Pope. The estate passed through many hands until in 1684 it was sold to Ralph Sheldon of Bewley (Worcs) in whose family it remained until 1901 when Henry James Sheldon died without direct heirs and the manorial rights appear to have lapsed.

The Ferris Manor House retains part of the core of the old 16th/17th century house. This

house was owned by the Walford family from the 1657 and they carried out major building works from 1666. During the 18th century they had become wealthy farmers and landowners and had the building restyled in the Queen Ann fashion, which was very much in vogue with the aristocracy.



It was sold to the Harris family – who were Quakers, in 1797. Joseph Harris sold the house to the Society of Friends for the sum of £1200 'for the purposes of a school' in 1842. It remained part of Sibford School until 2001 when it was sold for private residential development.

Thirty years after the filming of the renowned documentary *Escape from Tibet*, the producers and film crew will be reunited in Sibford with the two brothers, now British citizens, whose dangerous journey from the Roof of the World is told in the film. Using film clips and photographs, they will tell the story of how the film was made.

Text messages are being sent demanding payment for alleged parking offences and threatening to increase the fine in the event of non payment. **It is a scam.** Do not click on the links.

Keyless cars. There is a well organised and professional gang of crooks operating in the Oxfordshire area. Vehicles are being stolen from just outside houses, normally at night but occasionally during the day. They steal your car key signals whilst outside your house then use this signal to steal your car. At the same time de-activating tracking signals (All very clever electronics well beyond this Luddite.) Owners are being advised to purchase an RFID key fob, pouch or box to block the signals. I got a fob online (a Faraday bag) for about £6 together with a bogof deal for the spare key.

Netflix subscribers should beware scam emails advising their membership has expired.
